Message from the Superintendent

It is with great pride that I send out this year's annual report. It is our chance to inform the community about all that we're doing, providing a "state of the La Center School District" to parents, families and community members alike.

In this annual report, you will find an assortment of data points that I believe create a vision of our school district's successes and challenges. Even though there are many statistics included here, we are most proud of our on-time graduation rate. At 89.4%, we've achieved the highest graduation rate in recent history and are a full 10 percentage points above the state average. Not only are our students graduating on time with great success, they are also scoring higher on national standardized tests compared to state and national averages. Additionally, our graduates are being accepted at the best colleges, universities and military academies across the country.

I believe it is readily apparent to all of us who have lived here for some time that our little town is undergoing rapid change. As this change has progressed over the last few years, I am quite proud of how we have maintained the sense of community around our schools and have kept our focus on the success of every child.

As we move forward in the face of unprecedented enrollment and community growth, we are preparing to meet this challenge in a way that maintains the small district and community qualities that makes us so attractive to newcomers. After a great deal of community input and discussion, the school board will be presenting a bond measure to the voters on the February ballot to build a new middle school. Based on that same community input, the board has approved the purchase of a piece of property just east of the post office. It is perfectly suited to our needs for a new school while leaving suitable room for future growth. There will be some hard decisions to make over the

next couple of years as we find ways to provide classroom space for our increased enrollment. I ask that all stakeholders continue to communicate with me and our school board as we work to maintain our high standards of student success and family support. Please contact me if you have

LCES: Originally constructed in 1938, expanded in 1968 and updated and modernized in 2003-2004. All work is directed towards meeting the individual needs of our students as whole children. 

In the first semester of 2016, we had 54 middle school students with one or more F's. Of those 54 students, 52% had twelve or more absences, which is defined as chronic absenteeism. Another 30% are considered borderline chronic absenteeism, for a total of 82% that are considered borderline or chronically absent. If you have ever doubted the connection between attendance and school success, this should be fairly persuasive to think otherwise.












2017-18 La Center School District Growth Statistics



The low-growth estimate scenario estimates 439 new students by 2035 based on the county's population projections.


The high-growth scenario estimates 870 new students by 2035 based on current or known upcoming residential projects.




